## EDITORIAL

Another, hopefully 'fruitful', year is beginning and our planned activities for the Group for the next six months or so are detailed herein. I hope the items I have selected will give food for thought to at least some of you.

Recently the Assistant Editor (Joan) came across an item in the Times relating to proceedings in the House of Commons which made us both chuckle. I should first explain, for the benefit of new members, that in the early days of the NFG, we needed to define "fruit" (as opposed to "vegetables") and decide where to draw the line. Under a botanical definition, peas and beans, marrows and tomatoes are the 'fruit' of their respective plants, but to all gardeners they are veg. Stephen Twigg, the Minister responsible, eventually admitted "I believe we have redefined carrots as fruit under the fresh fruit scheme".

So, anyone for carrots and custard? Actually not as silly as it sounds at first; a nice moist carrot cake is delicious with cream or custard! Even so the NFG will not be getting into carrot –growing.

May we wish all members a productive and happy year in their gardens, orchards and glasshouses.
